## Lichfield City Neighbourhood Plan (LCNP) - Referendum 22 February 2018

Neighbourhood Planning was introduced by government as part of its Localism agenda and is a way for communities to decide the future of the places where they live and work in conformity with the strategic policies in the Local Plan (as developed and adopted by Lichfield District Council); the LCNP cannot contradict the Local Plan.

The Neighbourhood Plan Committee, a cross-party Steering Group of Lichfield City Councillors, has overseen the development of the LCNP since 2014.

If a Parish Council has a neighbourhood plan in place it would receive 25% of Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) contributions from a developer as opposed to 15% without a Neighbourhood Plan. This element of CIL can be spent on provision, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure, or anything else that is concerned with addressing demands that development places on an area. This gives neighbourhoods more freedom and power to spend CIL money on a wide range of things. The existence of an adopted Neighbourhood Plan ensures as much CIL money as possible is retained by the Parish in which the development is taking place, to be spent in consultation with residents and in accordance with the priorities laid out in the Neighbourhood Plan.

The LCNP focuses on **economic and employment issues** rather than housing. The City is well positioned to increase its economic base, with a highly skilled workforce and excellent road & rail links, for example. The City also boasts numerous attributes and attractions that encourage tourism.

The LCNP has been prepared after considerable community involvement and engagement, a **summary of key engagement/publicity activity** is contained at **Appendix A**.

The different topic areas within the LCNP reflect priorities highlighted by those who attended workshops or responded to consultations. Views expressed were condensed into **broad objectives**:

- Increase higher value employment activities in the City
- Increase the number of start-up businesses in the City
- Increase local retail spend
- Increase high spend tourism and length of stay
- Increase levels of employment and commercial activity in cultural, creative, medical and educational sectors
- Improve pedestrian access into and around the City Centre and between Lichfield City Railway Station, Trent Valley Railway Station and the Cricket Lane Strategic Development Allocation
- Maintain and enhance the City's historic character, particularly its medieval core.

To support these objectives, a number of **policies were developed** and consulted upon, culminating in the **Pre-Submission Consultation (July - September 2016) including 52 statutory consultees..** The consultation was publicised in the local press as well as social media and posters in prominent City locations (**detailed in Appendix A**).

The revised Neighbourhood Plan was submitted to Lichfield District Council for further *informal* consultation in February 2017, with a revised document *formally* submitted to Lichfield District Council in July 2017 for further consultation to be undertaken by Lichfield District Council and the statutory independent examination.

From this time the City Council had no control over timings of subsequent events or any revisions to the plan; the only option was to withdraw the LCNP if the City Council was unhappy with the Examiner's recommended amendments. Following receipt of the independent examination report, Lichfield District Council complied with statutory timescales to confirm the LCNP could pass to referendum stage and then to organise and hold the referendum, hence the referendum date of 22 February. Referendum arrangements will be similar to any other election with postal voting & poll cards.

The question asked at the referendum will be: "Do you want Lichfield District Council to use the neighbourhood plan for Lichfield City to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?"

The LCNP must obtain majority support from electors if it is to be adopted. If adopted, LCNP then becomes part of the formal Development Plan for the area, with legal force, and helps shape the direction of future employment development in the City.
